NATIONAL EdGEO WORKSHOP PROGRAM

EdGEO HIGHLIGHTS: 1996 - Spring 1997

- In 1996, eleven EdGEO workshop applications were approved (see attached table): two in Saskatchewan, three in Alberta, one in Nova Scotia, four in Quebec, and one in British Columbia (for partial funding for resources for five workshops). We approved \$24,636.87 in EdGEO funding for 1996 workshops. \$3,326.19 was carried over to future workshops so our 1996 average cost per teacher was \$63.05. Funding for a special issue of WAT ON EARTH (a newsletter for teachers) was also approved.
- 2) To date in 1997, EdGEO funding has been approved for seven workshops (Eastend, Ottawa, Edmonton, Quebec City (2), Rimouski and Drumheller) and two applications (Regina and Bridgewater) are pending. So far, the only other group that has indicated that it plans to apply for funding is the SMA/SGS for workshop component of the Saskatchewan Mines Tour.
- 3) At the 1996 CGEN meeting it was decided that CGEN/EdGEO should co-sponsor with GAC/MAC, in conjunction with the Ottawa97 GAC/MAC annual meeting: 1) a teachers' workshop, primarily for local teachers (May 17,18); 2) a fieldtrip for EdGEO teacher graduates from across Canada and interested geoscientists, and 3) a special session on geoscience education "Earth to Classroom Perspectives on Earth Science Education". The response to the Earth to Classroom ..." session was very positive. We received 15 abstracts and the session has been expanded from one-half day on Monday afternoon to a second half-day on Tuesday morning. The field trip also promises to be a stimulating experience for teachers and participating geoscientists. We have 17 teachers and two geoscientists (including me) registered with four geoscientists as field trip leaders. Unfortunately, the teachers' workshop for Ottawa area teachers has had a very poor response. Last week only four teachers had registered and this event is in danger of being cancelled.
- 4) Pan-Canadian Science project: The second draft of "The Common Framework of Science Learning Outcomes K to 12" was distributed to interested parties in early April. Chris Gilboy and I served on a 5-member subcommittee that reviewed this 250-page document for the Saskatchewan Geological Society's School Liaison Committee. Several very general comments were offered regarding the earth science component of the document (this was stated to be the last opportunity for public input), but our overall opinion was favourable and if curriculum developers make serious use of the framework, Canadian students have a good chance of substantially improving their literacy in this and the physical and life sciences. 5) A financial statement for the 1996-1997 fiscal year is enclosed. Our balance at the end of March was \$11,548.57 with \$5,500 in funding requests and \$1000

in travel expenses to Ottawa97 outstanding. It is anticipated that we will be able to draw on the \$12,500 that CSPG has allocated to EdGEO in their next fiscal year, beginning in September 1997. In addition we are finally in a position to launch a corporate funding drive through the Canadian Geological Foundation. This will be discussed at the CGEN meeting in Ottawa.

- Our search for an EdGEO logo has been unsuccessful to date. New ideas will be sought at the CGEN meeting.
